Blues & Ragtime Jazz: 13 & 24 December

Sandino Cerrado (Vocals, Resonator Guitar and Blues Harp) and *Georgia Ollier* (Washboard) play Blues and Ragtime Jazz, with classics ranging from the '20s to the '60s as well as original compositions.

Together they've toured in seven countries across three continents performing in bars, restaurants, festivals and markets, and have recorded two studio albums and a live DVD.

After a lengthy tour in Southern USA this year, including shows at the Juke Joint Blues Festival and the Deep Blues Festival in Clarksdale, Mississippi, the duo now return to Australia for the Summer 2017/18, bringing with them a new repertoire and more experience direct from the Delta.

Gary Hosking's CD Review

Sean Taylor - Love Against Death

Sean Taylor is a roots singer-songwriter and multiinstrumentalist from Kilburn, England He has released eight albums; Love against Death is his fifth album. Sean sings about relationships and the optimism of love.

I purchased this CD after reading an article about Sean and was instantly drawn to the poetic nature of his songs, about subjects that resonates with him and his values and with which I also empathise.

The album has an overall acoustic feel, showcasing Sean's instrumental and song writing abilities, his breathy vocals supplemented when required by a bluesy growl. His songs are supported by the judicious use of excellent musicians playing a variety of instruments.

The musicians are: Sean: vocals, acoustic & electric guitars, piano, organ, harmonica. Mark Hallam: bass, drums, Hammond organ, Wurlitzer, accordion. Warren Hood: violin. Eliza Wilkinson: backing and shared vocals Kim Decamps: pedal steel

The album kicks off with a call to *Stand Up*, about greed, poverty and injustice – his words more than relevant in today's political climate. The piano sets the shuffling groove with bluesy harmonica and guitar fills.

Kilburn is a reflection of life in his home town with a wonderful acoustic guitar lead break. *Absinthe Moon*, a beautiful piano driven song The chorus, "Breath against breath, Love against death, Flesh against flesh, Leaves hope for all the rest".

Western Intervention – the title says it all - contains some howling harmonica lines over the driving rhythm.

The pace slows with *Cassady*, a ballad about the Beat literary era of the 1950's. Sean's tasteful piano is supplemented by pedal steel fills and lead break. *Sixteen Tons* (a Merle Travis song) is an up tempo rock / blues about a coal miner "owing his soul to the company store" with Sean ripping out some great rock /blues lead guitar. *Ballad of a Happy Man* has a rollicking country rock feel with accordion and violin backing.

Raglan Road is a traditional Irish tune about unrequited love, with violin and accordion backing. *Heaven* tackles the theme of drug addiction. A Wurlitzer driven ballad with bluesy guitar fills and lead.

Coal and Dole, is about "working class heroes" and the Thatcher Government closure of some coal mines and subsequent union strikes in England in1984. The chorus asks, "Which side were you on?" The tone of the song is strengthened with some classy, atmospheric guitar lines.

Les Fleurs du Mal (relating to a book of modernist poems by a French author) picks up the pace. This is a funky, R&B track with Hammond organ providing the groove.

Completing the album is *Hymn*, a piano based slow ballad backed by violin with Eliza sharing the vocals. It's "A song for the weak, a poem for the poor" as the opening lines state. A song where he says that, "No soul is left ignored".

Wangaratta Festival of Jazz and Blues – Music, Moments and Memories 3-5 November 2017

This is a wonderful festival in its 28th year, held across a number of venues in the town which is in the North East of Victoria, between Rutherglen and the King River Valley (excellent vineyards and craft breweries close by).

The main Blues program is in a large marquee in the picturesque Merriwa Park with local tasty food and beverage stalls around the perimeter. The music program runs over the 3 days, Friday evening and then Saturday and Sunday from late morning till late.

Jon Cleary and his New Orleans Absolute Monster Gentelman band were the headline act. Jon and

the band were invited to Fats Domino's second line parade in New Orleans which had taken place the day before he was in Wangaratta. But the Wangaratta Festival of Jazz and Blues go-getters gave their thanks to Jon and the band for their commitment to the Australian Music Industry. The venue was packed and they had the audience up and bopping for their 90 minute set. We were treated to a mix of great New Orleans classics as well as a selection of Jon Cleary tunes penned across his career.

The band also acknowledged the recent passing of Fats Domino and played some of his music. Jon played a solo set on the Friday evening at one of the jazz venues and played *Blueberry Hill* in a very moving tribute. *Andrea Marr* and the *Funky Hitmen* were also up to the task and kept people on their musical high the following night.





Other great Blues performances were provided by *Lloyd Speigel* who entertained everyone enormously with his fabulous guitar playing and great storytelling inbetween songs including stories of time spent with

Brownie McGee. Shannon Bourne played a Jimi Hendrix tribute set.

I heard for the first time John McNamara, a very impressive blues and soul performer who earlier this year released his second album, *Rollin With It*, recorded in Memphis and Shane Pacey Trio (Shane is guitarist with the Bondi Cigars). In this lineup Shane predominantly plays 50s and 60s Chess Records music.

Another treat was Spiderbait playing with the Wangaratta Horns of Death. A friend described this to me as about 50 kids up on stage – anyone

who could blow a horn - together with accomplished horn players, led by *Adam Simmons*, improvising some of Spiderbaits heaviest and blues drenched instrumentals. *Lachy Dooley Group, Pugsley Buzzard, Justin Yap, Richard Perso, Kenin Borich Express, Jimi Hocking, Gospel Belles, Foreday Riders, Chango Tree, Caiti Baker, and the Blues Brothers 3677* completed the packed weekend blues program.
